Adaptability

- Depending on the species:
 - Hardiness zones 3 12
 - Sun shade
 - Wet dry soils
 - Large tree, medium tree, small tree, shrub
 - Evergreen & deciduous
 - Native, non-native & hybrids

Universal Appeal & Exciting New Hybrids

- Magnolias are grown worldwide and are popular for their flowers, beauty, low maintenance and "toughness"
- Gardeners are excited by new hybrids



Resilience & Low Maintenance

- Hurricane resistance research in Florida:
 - Southern Magnolia rated in the top 3!
 - Sweetbay magnolia also ranked high
 - Observations suggest other magnolias also are wind-resistant
- Magnolias considered low maintenance and pest resistant

Study

Since 1992 when Hurricane Andrew struck south Florida, we have been studying the impacts of hurricanes on urban forests (Duryea et al. 1996; Duryea et al. 2007a; Duryea et al. 2007b). Star Magnolia, Magnolia stellata

- Very cold hardy, Zones (3) 4 8
- White, 3 5 in. flowers in early spring
- Each flower has 12 to 40 petal-like tepals, looking like a starburst
- Grows slowly as a multi-stemmed, broad-spreading, small tree or large shrub to 15 ft. or more
- Leaves are 4 8 in. long and 3 in. wide, dropping in fall
- Hundreds of cultivars and hybrids!



Spring Welcome® Magnolia


Saucer Magnolia, *Magnolia × soulangiana*, and Hybrids

- Cold hardy, Zones (4) 5 8 (9)
- Fragrant, white to pink to purple flowers 3 12 in. across in early spring
- Grows as an upright to rounded tree, becoming picturesque with age
- Leaves are 3 10 in. long and wide, dropping in fall
- Hundreds of cultivars and hybrids!

Improved hybrids: Jon Jon

- Peak bloom in mid- to late spring
- Weeks of flowering: 5.7



Improved hybrids: Daybreak



- "True" pink, not purply-pink
- Peak bloom in late spring
- Weeks of flowering: 5.5




American Magnolia Breeder:

- **■** Evergreen, Zones (5) 6 9
- Fragrant, white, large flowers up to 12 in. across
- Grows up to 80 ft. tall and 25-35 ft. wide but usually smaller in cultivation
- Leaves are shiny on top and underside often covered in colorful hairs
- Dozens of cultivars!







- Trademarked name of the patented cultivar, 'STRgra'
- Dwarf: unknown ultimate size
- Rounded form (unique)



Champak, Magnolia champaca

- Evergreen
- Tropical plant growing in Zones (9b) 10 12 to the Equator
- Flowers spring, summer, and sporadically in winter
- Flowers 2 3 in. wide, creamy white to pale yellow to yellow-orange, EXTREMELY fragrant
- Leaves 6 10 in. long and 2½ in. wide
- Grows as a small tree up to 30 ft. or more tall and wide






- ■Sweetbay magnolia
- ■Ashe magnolia
- Yellow-flowered magnolias



Sweetbay, Magnolia virginiana



- 3-in. white flowers in late springsummer with a sweet, lemony fragrance
- Native; grows up to 40 50 ft. tall and 20 ft. wide, but larger in the wild
- Silver leaf undersides

Northern ecotype – var. *virginiana* Shrubby and deciduous; Zones 5-7



Southern ecotype – var. *australis* Tree-form and evergreen; Zones 7-10

Ashe Magnolia, *Magnolia* macrophylla var. ashei

- Native; found only in ravines in Florida where it is endangered
- 12-in. flowers are white with a purple blotch and open in late spring
- Tree produces flowers when as young as 3 -5 years old
- Leaves are 1 2 ft. long and half as wide, with silvery undersides
- Grows as a small, multi-stemmed tree up to 30 ft. tall and wide
- Hardy in Zones 6 8




Yellow Flowered Magnolias

- Native Magnolia acuminata provides
 - Yellow flower color
 - Late flowering (avoiding frost damage)
 - Cold hardiness, heat tolerance, soil adaptability
- Asian *Magnolia denudata* provides
 - Large flower size and form
 - Flowering before leaves bud out
- Magnolia × soulangiana also sometimes used in breeding
- Must be budded or grafted so are less available



Evergreen Shrub Magnolia *Magnolia laevifolia*



- 6 12 ft. tall and up to 6+ ft. wide; Zones (7) 8 10
- White flowers 2 3 in. wide


Pink and Purple Banana-shrub *Magnolia figo var. crassipes*



- 6 12 ft. tall and wide and sometimes up to 20 ft. tall
- Flowers 2-in. cup-shaped, pink
- Not as fragrant as the "regular"
- Zones (7) 8 11




Magnolia figo var. *crassipes* 'Purple Queen' - 'Royal Robes'




