Undergraduate Certificate in Historic Preservation Studies (CHPS)

The certificate is available to students currently enrolled in an undergraduate program at the University of Georgia as well as individuals who already hold an undergraduate degree.

Program Objectives

- To develop within students an awareness of the contribution that historic resourcesmake to the quality of environments and to the quality of life available to the general populace.
- To foster an understanding of historic preservation needs, problems, and opportunities and the role that individual citizens can play in the protection and perpetuation of historic resources.
- To prepare students, as citizens within their respective communities, to serve as volunteer members of citizen preservation organizations and/or government commissions and to provide informed leadership to these and any other community preservation efforts.
- To provide students an opportunity to study historic preservation as a part of their academic program or as a supplemental educational opportunity available to those who already hold an undergraduate level degree.

Curriculum

The undergraduate certificate program requires a student to complete a minimum of 15 hours of credit. These must include the 3 hours of certificate core requirements with the remaining 12 hours to be selected from the historic preservation curriculum.

Other courses may count toward the 15 hours required for the certificate upon approval by the Historic Preservation Coordinator.

Administration

The Historic Preservation Coordinator manages the certificate program with the assistance of the historic preservation faculty. Students entering the certificate program must satisfy all standard requirements for admission to undergraduate study at the University of Georgia and will be admitted to the certificate program only:

- After being admitted to an undergraduate degree program or non-degree
- When the course of study for the certificate is approved by the Historic Preservation Coordinator

Before being admitted to the certificate program, students must consult with the undergraduate coordinator or major professor in the student's degree program and also with the Historic Preservation Coordinator. Students already holding an undergraduate degree in an appropriate field may pursue the certificate by applying for non-degree status. Upon receiving non-degree status, the student may contact the Historic Preservation Coordinator to initiate enrollment in the certificate program.

For undergraduate degree students, the certificate is awarded upon completion of certificate requirements *and* completion of the Undergraduate's degree program in which the student is enrolled.

For students already holding an Undergraduate degree, the certificate is awarded at the end of the semester in which the certificate requirements are satisfied.
