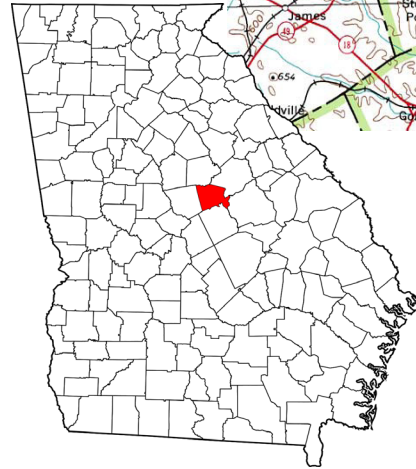




# Baldwin County, Georgia



## Findings

The Center for Community Design and Preservation (CCDP) located within the University of Georgia’s College of Environment + Design (CED) conducted a Phase I historic resource survey of Baldwin County, Georgia in June 2011. The project area covered the approximately 230 square miles of unincorporated land within county limits. Baldwin county is bordered by Putnam to the north, Hancock to the northeast, Washington to the east, Wilkinson to the south, and Jones to the West. The resource survey was performed by historic preservation professionals, and graduate students in the Masters of Historic Preservation program (MHP) at the CED. The survey consisted of background research, windshield and pedestrian field work, data collection and analysis.

The information collected by the field survey was entered into Georgia’s Natural, Archaeological, and Historic Resources Geographical Information System (GNARHGIS) which is the repository for all of the current statewide historic resources survey data.

## Summary

A total of 53 resources were documented that meet and maintain a minimum level of age, integrity, and significance. The construction date of all identified resources range from 1805-1970; the period with the most extant resources is from 1910-1919 with 12 (22.6%), followed by 1880-1889 with 11 (20.8%). There are nearly the same number of cemeteries (24) as single family dwellings (23). The majority of buildings surveyed (96%) did not exhibit any type of High Style architecture, and are consider to be of no academic style.
