



Bryan County, Georgia



Findings

The Center for Community Design and Preservation (CCDP) located within the University of Georgia’s College of Environment + Design (CED) conducted a Phase I historic resource survey of Bryan County, Georgia in June 2009. The project area covered the approximately 430 square miles of unincorporated land within county limits. The county is bordered by Effingham to the north, Chatham to the northeast, Liberty to the south and southwest, Evans to the west, and Bulloch to the northwest. The resource survey was performed by graduate students in the Masters of Historic Preservation program (MHP) and the Masters of Landscape Architecture program (MLA) at the CED. The survey consisted of background research, windshield and pedestrian field work, data collection and analysis.

Summary

A total of 125 resources were documented that meet and maintain a minimum level of age, integrity, and significance. The construction date of all identified resources range from 1839-1979; the period with the most extant resources was 1930-1939 with 27 (21.6%) followed by 1940-1949 with 20 (16%). Of the resources 115 are buildings while 10 are burial sites. From the buildings surveyed, 8 are vacant, 95 are single family dwellings, 6 are religious facilities, 1 is an office, and 2 are stores. Styles identified from the single family dwellings are Craftsman (34), Folk Victorian (4), Colonial Revival (3), and 31 which did not exhibit any type of High Style architecture, and are considered to be of no academic style.
