



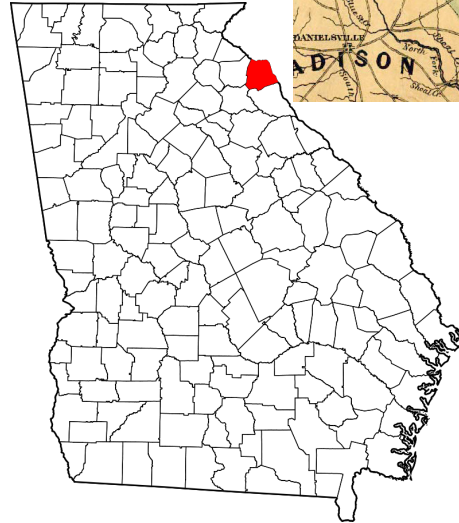
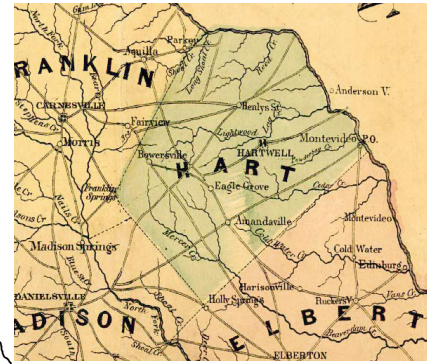
Hart County, Georgia



Findings

The Center for Community Design and Preservation (CCDP) located within the University of Georgia's College of Environment + Design (CED) conducted a Phase I historic resource survey of Hart County, Georgia from October 2007 through February 2008. The project area covered the approximately 240 square miles of unincorporated land within county limits. The county is bordered by South Carolina to the north and northeast, Elbert County to the South, Madison County to the southwest, and Franklin to the west.

The resource survey was performed by graduate students in the Masters of Historic Preservation program (MHP) and the Masters of Landscape Architecture program (MLA) at the CED. The survey consisted of background research, windshield and pedestrian field work, data collection and analysis.



Summary

A total of 197 resources were documented that meet and maintain a minimum level of age, integrity, and significance. The construction date of all identified resources range from 1779-1966. The periods with the most extant resources are 1900-1909 and 1910-1919 with 53 resources each (26.8%) followed by 1920-1929 with 31 (15.7%).

Of the resources, 157 are buildings and 40 are burial sites. From the buildings surveyed, 45 are vacant, 98 are single family dwellings, 4 multi-family dwellings, 2 stores, and 2 religious facilities. Styles identified from the single family dwellings are Craftsman (9), Folk Victorian (2), Gothic Revival (4), Neoclassical Revival (2), and Queen Anne Revival (2). There are 79 which did not exhibit any type of High Style architecture, and are considered to be of no academic style.
