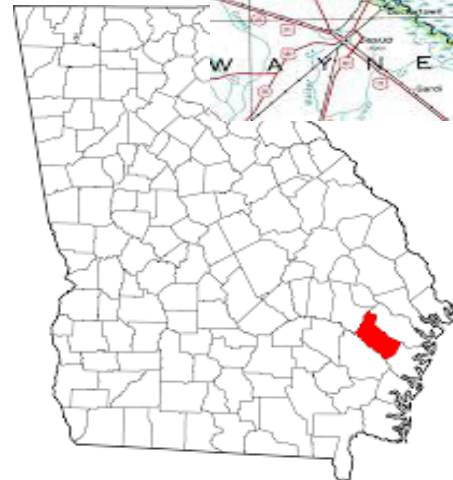




Long County, Georgia



Findings

The Center for Community Design and Preservation (CCDP) located within the University of Georgia’s College of Environment + Design (CED) conducted a Phase I historic resource survey of Long County, Georgia in June 2009. The project area covered the approximately 402 square miles of unincorporated land within county limits. The county is bordered by Liberty to the northeast, McIntosh to the southeast, Wayne to the southwest, and Tattall to the northwest. The resource survey was performed by graduate students in the Masters of Historic Preservation program (MHP) and the Masters of Landscape Architecture program (MLA) at the CED. The survey consisted of background research, windshield and pedestrian field work, data collection and analysis.

Summary

A total of 51 resources were documented that meet and maintain a minimum level of age, integrity, and significance. The construction date of all identified resources range from 1798-1954. There were equal numbers of resources extant from the 1880s through the 1930s. Resources tapered off at either end of that range. Of the resources 42 are buildings while 9 are burial sites. From the 43 buildings surveyed, 9 are vacant, 28 are single family dwellings, 3 are religious facilities, and 1 is a business.

Styles identified from the single family dwellings are Craftsman (11), one of Queen Anne Revival, Gothic Revival, and Folk Victorian, and 12 which did not exhibit any type of High Style architecture, and are consider to be of no academic style.
