



Oglethorpe County, Georgia



Findings

The Center for Community Design and Preservation (CCDP) located within the University of Georgia's College of Environment + Design (CED) conducted a Phase I historic resource survey of the City of Social Circle, Georgia in August, September, and October 2011. The project area covered the approximately 435 square miles within the county of unincorporated ares. The center of the county is approximately 17 miles east of Athens. Oglethorpe County is bordered by Madison to the north, Green to the south, Wilkes to the east, and Clarke and Oconee to the west.

The resource survey was performed by graduate students in the Masters of Historic Preservation program (MHP) at the CED. The survey consisted of background research, windshield and pedestrian field work, data collection and analysis.



Summary

A total of 145 resources were documented that meet and maintain a minimum level of age, integrity, and significance. The construction date of all identified resources range from 1795-1981; the period with the most extant resources is from 1880-1899 with 46, followed by 1900-1919 with 42.

The majority of identified resources are buildings (77.2%), and the most common building type is the single family dwelling of which 90 were identified. Styles ranged from Craftsman (10), Folk Victorian (13), and Greek Revival (8). The majority of buildings (72) did not exhibit any type of High Style architecture, and are consider to be of no academic style.
