



Paulding County, Georgia



Findings

The Center for Community Design and Preservation (CCDP) located within the University of Georgia’s College of Environment + Design (CED) conducted a Phase I historic resource survey of Paulding County, Georgia from February through June 2006. The project area covered the approximately 304 square miles of unincorporated land within county limits. The county is bordered by Bartow to the north,, Cobb to the east, Douglas to the southeast, Carroll to the south, Herolson to the southwest, and Polk to the west. The resource survey was performed by graduate students in the Masters of Historic Preservation program (MHP) and the Masters of Landscape Architecture program (MLA) at the CED. The survey consisted of background research, windshield and pedestrian field work, data collection and analysis.

Summary

A total of 448 resources were documented that meet and maintain a minimum level of age, integrity, and significance. The construction date of all identified resources range from 1820-2006. The period with the most extant resources is 1900-1909 with 140 resources (31.3%) followed by 1920-1929 with 74 (16.5%). The majority of the other resources are from the few decades immediately before or after these years. Of the resources, 402 are buildings and 46 are burial sites. From the buildings surveyed, 38 are vacant, 315 are single family dwellings, 14 are stores, 14 are businesses, 4 are restaurants, and 4 are religious facilities. The styles identified from the single family dwellings are Craftsman (39), Folk Victorian (57), Greek Revival (6), English Vernacular Revival (8), Colonial Revival (6), and Queen Anne Revival (2). There were 191 which did not exhibit any type of High Style architecture, and are consider to be of no academic style.
