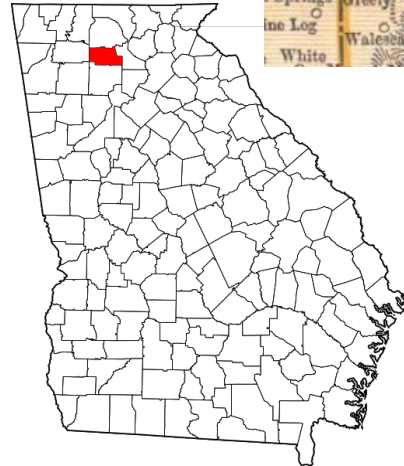


Pickens County, Georgia



Findings

The Center for Community Design and Preservation (CCDP) located within the University of Georgia’s College of Environment + Design (CED) conducted a Phase I historic resource survey of Pickens County, Georgia from May through July, 2007. The project area covered the approximately 230 square miles of unincorporated land within county limits. The county is bordered by Gilmer to the north, Dawson to the east, Cherokee to the south, Bartow to the southwest, and Gordon to the west. The resource survey was performed by graduate students in the Masters of Historic Preservation program (MHP) and the Masters of Landscape Architecture program (MLA) at the CED. The survey consisted of background research, windshield and pedestrian field work, data collection and analysis.

Summary

A total of 195 resources were documented that meet and maintain a minimum level of age, integrity, and significance. The construction date of all identified resources range from 1832-1955. The period with the most extant resources is 1910-1919 with 45 resources (27.8%) followed by 1920-1929 with 40 (24.7%). Of the resources, 162 are buildings and 32 are burial sites. From the buildings surveyed, 21 are vacant, 126 are single family dwellings, 3 are stores, 4 are religious facilities, and one school, rail related buildings, and multifamily dwelling. The only style identified from the single family dwellings is Craftsman (7). There are 79 which did not exhibit any type of High Style architecture, and are consider to be of no academic style.
