



Certificate in Cultural Landscape Conservation

This certificate is available to students currently enrolled in a master's program at UGA as well as individuals who already hold a master's degree.

The intent of the certificate in Cultural Landscape Conservation is to provide students with:

- An introduction to the concept of landscape stewardship.
- An awareness of the contributions that cultural landscapes make to environment quality and the overall quality of life.
- An understanding of both the problems and opportunities related to restoring, protecting, and sustaining these landscapes.
- Knowledge and insight needed to advise individuals, groups, and government units in the identification, protection, and perpetuation of historic and cultural landscapes for the use and welfare of society.
- An opportunity to study the value and protection of cultural landscapes as a part of their academic program or as a supplemental education opportunity available to those who already hold a master's degree.

The certificate program requires a student to complete **15 hours** of credit and is the equivalent of a minor concentration. Three hours of credit toward the certificate may be satisfied by a historic or cultural landscape conservation-related thesis in the Master of Historic Preservation, Master of Landscape Architecture, or Master of Environmental Planning and Design programs. The thesis proposal must be jointly approved by the graduate coordinator or major professor of the student's degree program and the Historic Preservation Graduate Coordinator.
